Speaker and Facilitator details

(in order of appearance)

Professor John McNeil is Head of the Department of Epidemiology and Preventive Medicine, Monash University, Melbourne, Australia, and Head of the School of Public Health and Preventive Medicine at the Alfred Hospital site. He is a Physician whose principal research interest is in the use of drugs to prevent chronic disease. Professor McNeil's department covers a broad range of research activities and hosts a number of national research centres. These include Australian coordinating centres for research in critical care and anaesthesia, several major clinical registries, cohort studies and large-scale clinical trials. His department provides a skill base in epidemiology, biostatistics and data management that underpins the clinical and public health research activities of Monash University and its major teaching hospitals.

Dr Rut F Öien is a GP, clinician, researcher and the manager of Blekinge Wound Healing Centre, a specialist unit for wound management, which is a model for specialised primary care units in Sweden. She has initiated and developed the Swedish national quality registry on hard-to-heal ulcers, the Registry of Ulcer Treatment (RUT), of which she is the registry manager. In RUT patients with leg, foot and pressure ulcers are registered and followed to ulcer healing.



Dr Sue Evans is Associate Director of the Centre of Research Excellence in Patient Safety (CRE-PS) and Head of the Clinical Registry Unit at Monash University. Sue has a keen interest in improving measurement of quality in health and manages a number of large clinical registries. Sue leads a number of research projects exploring how best to use data to monitor quality of care.

Ms Charne Miller is a Research Fellow with the La Trobe University / Alfred Health Clinical School. For over a decade Charne has led and been a co-investigator on a variety of clinical trials and evaluation studies in the field of wound management. Charne is Treasurer of the Australian Wound Management Association (Victoria), Chair of the state Scientific Committee for 2015, and Associate Editor of the national journal Wound Practice & Research.

Dr Denise O'Connor is a Senior Research Fellow and NHMRC Public Health Fellow at the Australasian Cochrane Centre, School of Public Health and Preventive Medicine, Monash University, and Co-Director of the NHMRC-funded Australian Satellite of the Cochrane Effective Care and Organisation of Care (EPOC) Group, Monash University. Denise's research is in health services, focusing on the design, delivery and uptake of health professional behaviour change interventions to translate knowledge from research into clinical practice. Her expertise is in assessing the causes of research translation problems and designing theory- and evidence-informed interventions to support professional practice change.

Ms Marianne Cullen is the Clinical Nurse Consultant in Wound Care for the Gippsland region. Her role is part of a Department of Health Regional Wound Management project which aims to provide training, education and access to clinical support for Home and Community Care clients in District Nursing Services and Public Sector Residential Aged Care Facilities across the Gippsland Region. Prior to this she was the Manager for Wound Management and Stomal Therapy Services at Latrobe Regional Hospital for 10 years.

Dr Carolina Weller is a Senior Research Fellow at Monash University School of Public Health and Preventive Medicine and the recipient of the NHMRC Australian Public Health Fellowship. Carolina is one of Australia's leading clinical venous leg ulcer researchers who has conceived, designed and successfully implemented a number of clinical trials in venous leg ulcer research

Dr Ashwini Arumugaswamy is a Thrombosis and Haemostasis research fellow at Monash Health, Melbourne. She completed undergraduate medical training at the University of Melbourne, and advance training in Clinical and Laboratory Haematology at Austin Health and Monash Health.

Ms Judith Barker is a Nurse Practitioner in Wound Management for ACT Health Rehabilitation, Aged and Community Care. Judith leads the Wound Management Service in the ACT community which provides consultancy and advice on the management of patients with acute and chronic wounds. She has improved access to wound management by setting up Nurse Practitioner wound clinics across the ACT. Judith also provides clinical consultancy and education for patients in their home and aged care facilities.

Dr Donna Nair has worked in chronic wound management for over 10 years across community, acute, general practice and residential areas. For the last five and a half years she has worked as Regional Wound CNC in the Grampians Region as one of eight Regional Wounds Victoria consultants. Donna is committed to improving chronic wound outcomes for rural Victorians through collaborative initiatives that cater to the needs of a region, as opposed to that of one location.
