## About the event

Advance care planning is a process between a person, their family/carer(s) and healthcare providers that supports people at any age or stage of health in understanding and sharing their personal values, life goals, and preferences regarding future medical care. Advance care planning is important in the delivery of quality person-centred care, and helps align the person's preferences for care with the care that they receive.

Presented by Decision Assist and Monash University Centre of Research Excellence in Patient Safety, this day of seminars will be run by experienced leaders in the field of advance care planning in Australia. The topics covered include advance care planning and the law, advance care planning across various healthcare sectors, the prevalence of advance care planning in Australia and advance care planning in Indigenous populations and culturally diverse communities.

This seminar is designed for physicians, aged care and palliative care workers, nurses, medical students and health professionals with an interest in advance care planning, as well as members of the general public who want to know more about advance care planning.
