MAGNET Launch

The Melbourne East MonAsh GeNeral Practic E DaTabase (MAGNET) research platform is a unique dataset capable of generating evidence to inform primary health care policy and practice and improve health outcomes for patients in Australia. MAGNET has emerged from a collaboration between Monash University and Inner East Melbourne Medicare Local (IEMML). Using data extraction tools, IEMML has generated a rich dataset of heath care data from general practices within the eastern metropolitan region of Melbourne. This dataset, together with Monash University's research capabilities, will enable the development of a robust evidence base to support targeted and priority-driven strategic research in primary health care.

Dr Mike Bainbridge Adjunct Professor Clinical Informatics, University of British Columbia, Canada Clinical Architect and Director, ASE Consulting Australia Pty. Ltd.

Mike has been a leading figure in Clinical Informatics for 25 years, working both for Governments and Industry. He has designed and brought to market the Clinical Computer Systems for Primary Care in the UK. He worked with the British Medical Association on the current 'Quality Based' General Practitioner Contract in the UK. and then led the Clinical Architecture and Assistive Technology teams at the National Health Service Connecting for Health (NHS CFH UK), delivering national standards in hardware design, clinical interface design, and usability of the electronic medical record. Since 2010, he has been based in Sydney working for the National E-Health Transition Authority (NEHTA) as a National Clinical Lead. He is currently focusing on Clinical Terminology and Coding and Medication Management in overall support of the National Health Reform.

Mark Booth is First Assistant Secretary of the Primary and Ambulatory Care Division at the Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing. In this role Mark is responsible for the development of initiatives in primary care including Medicare Locals, and GP Super clinics as well as responsibility for Rural Health.

Mark has worked in health policy areas in the UK and New Zealand and was a 2006–07 Commonwealth Fund Harkness Fellow in Health Care Policy. Whilst working in New Zealand he spent a year as senior health advisor to the New Zealand Minister of Health.

Mark's original background is as a health economist and he has post graduate qualifications in health economics, public administration and public health. Robert has a broad role at the Australian National University in the areas of health research and policy analysis, including a number of projects in the fields of primary health care and workforce policy. He participates in national committees, providing advice to governments on research and medical training. Robert is a former first assistant secretary in the Department of Health and Ageing where he was involved in research policy, Commonwealth / State relations, health workforce, rural health programs, safety and quality, and programs for better management of major diseases such as cancer, diabetes, and mental health. He also managed the Commonwealth's health workforce programs from the early 1990's.

Robert has previously chaired the Medical Training Review Panel and represented the Commonwealth on the Australian Medical Workforce Advisory Committee (AMWAC), the Australian Health Workforce Officials Committee (AHWOC), and the Australian Medical Council (AMC). He has also chaired a number of workforce committees that were established under the auspices of the Australian Health Ministers Council, including working parties on national medical registration and specialist medical training, and has represented Australia internationally on medical workforce matters.
